



150 people participated in 10 outdoor crafts








What are people saying about the library?

Library Timeline

Library opens in the basement of Village Hall on February 15, 1937 with 1,600 books



WFB Woman's Club and several residents of the Bay donated over 200 of their own books to the Library Friends of the Library, a citizen's group to support the library, forms in July 1953



Library checkouts increase in new building to 107,000 items in one year



New library building construction begins in January 1955 and opens in November 1955


Library collection of books grows to -8,219 in 1954



Library reaches capacity of 32,000 items in collection in 1967 Joined Milwaukee County Federated Library System in 1973



Friends of the White Fish Bay Public Library incorporates as a 501(c)3





Budget for books and periodicals was \$32,500 and boasted a circulation rate of 197,001 in 1990

Four communities previously served by WFB cooperated in building and funding the North Shore Library in 1986.



Village Board approves \$5.53 million expansion and renovation of the library in 2000

Entire collection moved to Amory temporary site in June 2001



Celebrates Grand Opening of new building in June 2002


Friends Mission Statement
