This summer we are doing a mid-summer drawing on July 18 and an endofsummer drawing on August 27. Good luck and happy reading!




Whitefish Bay TALKS: Ho-Chunk: People of the Sacred Language with Andi Cloud Thursday, June 29, 6:30PM

Join us for a discussion of the Ho-Chunk: People of the Sacred Language. Speaker Andi Cloud will give us an overview of the Ho-Chunk tribe, looking at their past, describing their present as well as what the future holds. She'll also sprinkle in some lessons for life.

About the presenter: Andi is a member of the Ho-Chunk Nation. Her waksik (wonk-sheek) name is Nizuwinga (nee-zhu-wing-ah), it means 'Rain Woman'. She was named by her Coka (cho-ka), the late Eugene Thundercloud. She is a member of the Thunder Clan. Andi is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse earning both her Bachelor of Science and Master of Education degrees. In 2021, Andi became the first Indigenous Storyteller-in-Residence for the Madison Public Library. In July 2022, Andi was appointed by Governor Evers to the Council of Library and Network Development. Her term ends July 1, 2025. Currently, Andi works for the Oneida Nation Early Head Start program and resides in the Town of Oneida.

The world is buzzing about the James Webb Space Telescope, the largest and most powerful space telescope ever built that will serve as the premier deep space observatory for the next decade. What will the James Webb Space Telescope help us achieve? UWM Planetarium Director and astronomer Dr. Jean Creighton will discuss our ever-expanding view of the universe and the search for new and exciting worlds beyond our solar system.

Bio of Presenter, Dr. Jean Creighton

Dr. Jean Creighton has always been inspired by how the cosmos works. She was born in Toronto, Ontario and grew up in Athens, Greece where her mother claims she showed a great interest in how stars form from the age of five. She studied physics at the University of Athens and went on to earn a Master's degree from Saint Mary's University in Halifax, Nova Scotia, and a PhD in Astrophysics from the University of Waterloo. She began teaching astronomy at UW-Milwaukee in 1999 and in 2007, she took over as director of UWM's Manfred Olson Planetarium. In 2014, Creighton was selected by NASA to be an Airborne Astronomy Ambassador and spent 20 hours in the stratosphere on SOFIA, the largest moving observatory in the world. She's very proud to have shared the cosmos with over 150,000 members of the community.

Whitefish Bay Neighbors: BJ Gruling Tuesday, June 20, 6PM Please Register:





State Park Passes

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the Whitefish Bay

Public Library announced a library program to make state park and forest vehicle admission day passes available to library card holders at Whitefish Bay. Library card holders can check out a day pass for free admission for one vehicle at any state park, forest, or recreation area where admission is required.

How do the passes work?

Each week, a select number of passes will be available.

Stop by the display area near the adult reference desk to grab a card to checkout a pass.

- Bring the card up to the front desk.
- In order to take the pass, you must:
- Have a library card in good standing
- Have a WI license plate
- Know the date of your visit. (The date of use must be written on the pass. We can write a range of 3 days if you know the approximate date).

Resource Spotlight: Historical Collections

<u>The Whitefish Bay Public Library houses the Mimi Bird Historical Collection and the Whitefish Bay and Fox Point Directories.</u>

Mimi Bird was a resident of Whitefish Bay since the age of four. In the 1980's Mimi researched the history of the community during which she compiled materials on the area, photographed homes, businesses and landmarks, and organized it all into a set of thirty-nine volumes which she donated to the Library. Mimi Bird's focus was primarily on Whitefish Bay history, but she also collected historical information on the early Town of Milwaukee settlers, Glendale, and River Hills as well as the construction of Highway 141.

The Milwaukee County Historical Society recognized Mimi for her outstanding work and in her Milwaukee Journal Sentinel obituary she was praised as 'the undisputed expert on local history, both in the village and the greater North Shore area.' Few communities have such a historical treasure. The physical volumes are available for supervised viewing and are kept in the Mimi Bird memorial bookcase next to the Adult Reference Desk of the Whitefish Bay Public Library.

The Whitefish Bay and Fox Point Directories from 1928-2000 contain addresses of the residents of Whitefish Bay, Fox Point, and surrounding communities compiled by the Whitefish Bay Woman's Club. The directory also contains advertisements for local businesses.
