Happy spring! We've got some new and exciting things happening at the library, thanks to our Friends. First off we've got changes coming to our Hot Reads collection. Hot Reads are those titles with long holds lists that everyone wants to get their hands on. Our designated Hot Reads copies can't be placed on hold and are first come first served. In 2023, Friends have committed to purchasing these hot titles and we're making a few changes. The collection will now be called the Lucky Day collection, meaning it's your lucky day if you find this item on the shelf and get to check it out. We'll also be able to purchase more copies of titles, so hopefully you'll get a hold of these titles faster. Lucky Day can be found right by our new books as you enter the Adult Services collection.

Friends have also continued to support the library's Take and Tinker Collection. Take and Tinker is a collection of tools, games, and other items that you wouldn't expect to find in a library. We recently purchased some new items including pickle ball rackets and paddles, an acoustic guitar, a green screen, a GoPro Video Camera, and a cornhole set. Friends have committed more money in 2023 so we'll see a bunch more items coming to Take and Tinker. Since the inauguration of the collection, here are the top 5 most popular items in Take and Tinker:

1) Cricut- An electronic cutting machine that can cut all sorts of designs from materials like paper, vinyl, card stock, and iron-on transfers.

2) Movie Projector- Perfect for outdoor movie nights or parties.3) Brother Sewing Machine- When you need to hem those pants or sew those curtains.

4) Metal Detector- Fun at the beach, park, or even in the backyard.5) Button Maker- Craft buttons for your backpack, hat, or shirt.

You can browse the collection in person, near our new large print books. We've also got a list of all items on our website. Take and Tinker items can be placed on hold so check what we have to offer.

My body itself attacking my hair keeps taking and taking until I am bare


reflection and time help dry off those tears and here i am left facing those fears


Look for these new bookshelves at our May sale!
