## **RFID**, What?

2016 is a busy year for Whitefish Bay Public Library (WFBPL) with several big projects to complete before year-end. A huge undertaking during the first part of the year was to convert our items to Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) tags. Previously 9 of 15 Milwaukee County Federated Library System (MCFLS) member libraries utilize RFID; WFBPL is the 10th library in MCFLS to convert and we are very happy to be coming up to speed on this staple of library technology.

## How and Why?

Libraries place RFID tags in each library item. The tags contain antennae that transmit barcode data to the system for checking materials in and out. Implementing RFID for library materials will result in: 1) faster, easier checkout of materials for library patrons; 2) fewer repetitive motion injuries for staff; 3) improved collection management by enabling us to more easily do inventories.

## When?

The RFID Conversion Project began April 1st and was finished on-time as of May 1st. Nearly every library which provided feedback on how they completed their RFID conversion project stated it took 2-4x longer than projected.

### Who?

Kudos to our superb library staff whose outstanding effort resulted in completing such a big project, while meeting an ambitious deadline. I am so proud to be a part of the excellent team at WFBPL!
