Children's Services Update

YA Programs in 2016

In 2016, one of the main goals for the youth services department was to offer more successful programs to our middle schoolers and high schoolers. It can be difficult to create programs for young adults: they often have a lot of after-school activities and commitments and they're more independent (i.e. their mom isn't going to sign them up for programs anymore!) We knew it would be difficult, but we also had a few things going for us: we have a large population of middle schoolers who come to the library after-school, and we also have Krista Hutley, who is the library's Administrative and Adult Services Librarian, but more importantly has a background in working with young adults. We also have the benefit of receiving support from Friends of the Whitefish Bay Public Library. Through the generous funding from Friends, we were able to offer a variety of exciting programs to our library's young adults in 2016.

Whitefish Bay Public Library is right down the street from the middle school, and as mentioned, we have a large group of students who use the library after school. Krista created Meet-Up Mondays to offer a monthly program to this group. There's always a simple craft and plenty of snacks, but sometimes the

teens just like to work on homework and hang out. We also offered Half-Day Craft Days to the teens. These events take place at noon on days when the middle schoolers have a half-day. We serve lunch (usually pizza) and offer a more complicated project. To celebrate a half-day in October, the teens feasted on pizza and made Franken Toys, which involves taking apart various toys and combining various parts to make a new toy. We also experimented with after-hours lock-in programs. We kicked off our Summer Reading Program with an after-hours lock-in event. Teens competed in a Wii gaming tournament, thanks to Friends funds, and we had craft stations and other activities. Since that program went so well, Krista created an after-hours glow-in-the-dark black-light party. The upstairs program room was transformed with black lights, neon balloons, glow-in-the-dark accessories, and neon craft supplies.

It's been a busy, successful year, and we hope we can continue the momentum in 2017. Teen programs are always more expensive to plan than programs for younger kids, and we are able to create really exciting programs because of our Friends funding. (We can also buy lots and lots of pizza!)
