The contest was open to amateur photographers of any age, with the categories of travel, portrait, architecture, nature, still life, black & white, children (i.e. entries by people 12 years or younger, not OF them), and staff (i.e. entries by staff members or their family members). Of the 400+ entries received, the quality and variety were remarkable. We look forward to repeating the photo contest yearly as a showcase for local talent.

Photos were judged by a panel of three professional, highly acclaimed photographers who blind-judged each submission for impact, composition and quality of lighting. Dave Gilo is a heavily awarded commercial photographer and filmmaker and has photographed athletes, celebrities and Presidents. Cindy Lesky is an innovative fine arts photographer, Wisconsin born-and-raised. She has produced some of the most visually arresting and awardwinning images around. Jay Filter is an advertising creative director turned internationally awarded photographer. Adult Services Update

We are nearly done with our inaugural year of presenting our monthly lecture series, Whitefish Bay TALKS. If you haven't heard the library hosts speakers to talk about art, history, food, culture, people, books and more! It's been a lot of fun and we've had a very diverse group of lecturers. I'm really excited to share with you the upcoming guests in this series.

In November we'll be doing something a little different for this series. On Thursday, November 17 at 6:30pm we're hosting Theater Gigante. Whitefish Bay residents Isabelle Kralj and Mark Anderson founded Theatre Gigante, an innovative, cutting edge theater company now in its 29th season. Theatre Gigante will present a talk and excerpts from *Spalding Gray: Stories Left To Tell*, a theater piece celebrating the life of internationally known monologist Spalding Gray. Three actors will perform stories representing different facets of Gray's life: LOVE, FAMILY, JOURNAL, ADVENTURE, and CAREER. This should be a really fun evening that you won't want to miss.

In December, we've got the perfect evening planned as the weather turns cold. On Monday, December 5 at 6:30pm Mark Kuehn will be here. Mark is the Curator and Board Director of the North Point Lighthouse Museum located in Lake Park. Mark will share with us the story of Milwaukee's first lighthouse built in 1837 at the end of what is now Wisconsin Ave and the relocation of the lighthouse to North Point in 1855. He will describe life at North Point as a keeper including Georgia Stebbins, North Point's longest serving keeper from 1881 until 1907.

For January we've invited back a speaker that we hosted in December of 2014. If you were here for our talk on Edmund Fitzgerald you'll remember speaker Rochelle Pennington. This time around Rochelle will enthrall us with the jaw-dropping true story of Sir Ernest Shackleton's "Imperial Trans-Antarctic Expedition" on the ship *Endurance*. This was a very perilous journey for 28 sailors and scientists who managed to survive 2 years in Antarctica thanks to the leadership of Shackleton. Rochelle is a fantastic speaker and I'm thrilled to have her visiting the library on Wednesday, January 18 at 6:30pm.

We're expecting a good turnout for these programs so be sure to register by giving the library a call or visiting our website. Just look for our Adult Programs tab. Children's Services Update

Expanding Early Childhood Offerings Beyond Storytime

The Youth Services Department offers 6-7 storytimes per week during our regular sessions throughout the year, and they are by far our most popular programs. Our storytimes usually follow a traditional storytime format, consisting of sharing books, songs, rhymes, and movement activities with children, parents, and caregivers.

This fall, we wanted to expand our early childhood offerings beyond storytime, including small scale walk-in craft programs, special concept storytimes, and larger Saturday morning programs. We hoped this would allow us to make our programs available to more members of our community, while also keeping our programming line-up full of fresh, exciting ideas. These programs would not be possible without the generosity of Friends of the Whitefish Bay Library. With Friends funds, we are able to purchase supplies that help us bring the following early childhood focused programs to families in our community:

-Picture Book Walk-In Crafts: a craft session inspired by illustrations from a picture book. Parents and caregivers are given early literacy prompts to enhance their child's experience, and children get to develop fine motor skills and creativity in simple, open-ended craft projects.

-Loose Parts Storytimes: a take on a traditional storytime with a loose parts playtime at the end. What are loose parts? They're open ended materials with endless possibilities for play and exploration. At these playtimes, children sort, scoop, rearrange, dig, rearrange and more.

–Toddler & Preschool Dance Party: a regular favorite among the families in our community. We create a playlist filled with movement songs, sing-a-long songs, and well-loved favorites. Best of all, we can create a program that encourages gross motor-skill development.

–Totally Untidy Tots: this new program centers on creating sensory experiences for young children. We will create messy stations for children to explore, using paint, shredded paper, playdough and other messy materials.
