

Who is our community and how does that impact what the WFB Public Library does?

The 2010 US Census shows Whitefish Bay has 14,110 residents, with a nearly even split between male and female. 74% of households have children under 18. In fact, WFB has the highest percentage of children under 18 and under 5 years of age, and the lowest percentage of seniors, of all north shore Milwaukee County communities.

Further, 77% of WFB residents 25-years and older have a Bachelor's degree or higher. In comparison to other communities, Whitefish Bay is a family friendly, highly-educated community. You knew we were unique, right!?

What does this have to do with the library? Well, our mission is "To be a cornerstone of the community by supporting an informed citizenry, promoting a love of learning and providing easy access to ideas, information, and resources for patrons of all ages." The materials, programs and services that the Library offers are in direct response to what our community wants and needs.

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Children's Services Update

This summer, we're putting an emphasis on STEAM-based programming at the library. STEAM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math, and it's part of a new trend to make creativity and artistic expression part of science and technology education. We love using STEAM at the library because it gives kids space to experiment, build, create, and have a ton of fun in the process.

Throughout July, elementary school aged kids will have lots of opportunities to be "STEAM-tastic"—we're offering great programs on both Tuesday mornings and Wednesday afternoons. They'll be transforming themselves into their superhero alter-egos (July 7/8) and having a paper airplane build-off on July 14/15. They'll also take ordinary paper and create a 3-D masterpiece at the "Paper Sculpture" program on July 21/22. On July 28/29, at "Flinking Balloons," we'll supply them with a variety of craft supplies and recyclable materials, and it's up to them to create a contraption that will keep their balloon hovering in mid-air, neither floating nor sinking, but "flinking."

During July, young adults will also be building and flexing their creative muscles. We're celebrating Comic Con in San Diego

with our "Random Fandom Paper Cosplay Challenge." Cosplay is "costume play" where people wear costumes to represent a favorite character. Usually cosplay is painstakingly created and the creators want to be as accurate as possible. We're taking that idea and turning it on its head: the teens who attend the program will be crafting their cosplays out of paper and they will have only a few hours to create.

We're ending our special summer programming with a great Family Fun program called the "Chain Reaction Challenge" on Saturday August 8th. This is a program perfect that is perfect for all ages and really drives home our STEAM mission. We're asking families to channel their inner-Rube Goldbergs to create a contraption or machine that will perform a very simple task in a very complicated way. There is a lot of problem-solving and creativity that will go into creating something like this, and we're excited to see the amazing results!

There's still plenty of time to sign-up and participate in our summer reading program, as well! This year, we're extending our program until August 28th, so if you haven't signed up yet, we'd love to get started on this exciting program!

Also in July, the Whitefish Bay Public Library along with North Shore Library and Brown Deer Public Library, is hosting the North Shore Community Reads! For this multi-community event, we will read and talk about "Memoir of the Sunday Brunch" by Julia Pandl. There are a number of events happening at the different libraries. Whitefish Bay is hosting two book clubs to talk about the book. The book clubs take place on July 2 at 6:30pm and on July 24 at 12pm. Then on July 29 at 6:30pm the library will host the author to talk about her book. Other events are still in the works, so check our website for a full list. middle-age and senior-age patrons. Please provide me with program suggestions and feedback at n.marsh@wfblibrary.org.

Hours

Survey comments suggested an interest in Sunday hours all year round, plus opening earlier or staying open later. I researched the impact and cost of expanding hours, which will be considered when developing the 2016 budget. Any change in hours, with corresponding budget impacts, will be taken to the Library Board of Trustees for consideration.

Why do patrons visit the Library or the website?

When visiting the library, respondents are mostly here to check out materials in our collection, primarily Adult and Children's books, audiobooks, music and movies. 79% check out 1-5 items per visit.

When visiting the website, respondents primarily use the online catalog, check their own account, or look up library information (i.e. hours, phone number).

How do they rate the collection?

The book collection is the highest rated part of the collection scoring an Excellent/Good rating. All of our materials received at least an Average/Good rating, though there were several comments about scratched music CDs and movie DVDs. Adult and Youth Services recently replaced hundreds of CDs and DVDs where the current copy was scratched, but still popular. As patrons, you can assist us with the effort of enhancing the DVD and CD collections by letting us know when a disc does not play correctly.

A number of survey comments suggested expanding some of our purchase areas for materials, including: romance books, foreign music CDs, jazz and classical music CDs, and knitting and art

As Acquisition Coordinator, you would:

- Act as liaison between the Friends organization and donors (for instance, private estates, consignment shops, etc.)
- Identify and maintain positive relationships with potential donors
- Identify and execute any other ideas which result in donations

The time commitment is expected to be no more than an hour per week, whenever is convenient for you.

We are looking for dependable person with basic knowledge of computers and data entry, a pleasant manner, patience and an ability to problem-solve.

Children's area

Survey respondents suggested moving the computers out of the Children's Tower so caregivers can have dedicated playtime without the computers as a distraction. This suggestion will be implemented over the summer (2015).

Databases

Do you know we have very useful databases? 68% of survey respondents never use our databases, while 23% use them at least a few times a year.

Based on stated interest in learning how to use the databases, Zinio and Overdrive, we want to let you know that we have "Book A Librarian" sessions in which you can sit with an Adult Reference Librarian 1-to-1 to learn how to use Zinio (to download magazines) and Overdrive (to download books and audiobooks). Stop by the Adult Reference Desk or call 414-964-4380 to book a session.

Also, Whitefish Bay Public Library is one of the few local libraries that offers Ancestry Library Edition for use in-library, which gives you access to Ancestry.com's wealth of resources for doing your family tree. I (Nyama) am active in the Wisconsin Library Association's Genealogy and Local History Roundtable. Starting this fall, I will lead classes on how to use our Ancestry database, to help people use this wonderful resource.

Thank you to everyone who participated in the 2014 Whitefish Bay Public Library Community Survey. We garnered lots of useful information that we are using to continually improve our collections, programs and services.
